
An Ounce of Prevention to Prepare Adult Family Home Owners for Future Epidemics







Background

In Washington state:

- Residents and staff in adult family homes (AFH) remain vulnerable to the impacts of disease outbreaks, especially epidemics.
- AFHs lack the resources to apply the same infection control measures as larger healthcare facilities.
- Clark County had the most AFHs per capita in Washington State (WA).
- The WA House Bill 1218¹ identified an epidemic preparedness need which prompted this work and the guidance ² we used to inform the project.
- Engaged AFH owners to determine what epidemic preparedness tools and information would be most useful to them.

Objectives

- Name two reasons for building partnerships between local health jurisdictions (LHJs) and the state department of health (DOH).
- 2. Identify one **effective way to engage** with Adult Family Home (AFH) owners.
- 3. Identify the **importance of using plain language** for public health guidance.

Methods

Collaboration and Shared Leadership³ developed:

- Clark County Public Health (CCPH)
- Washington State Department of Health (WA DOH)

Consulted³ regulatory partners

Community engagement³ with AFH owners through

- In-person meetings
- AFH Council Presentations^{4,5}
- Online survey
- Email


Increasing Level of Community Involvement, Impact, Trust, and Communication Flow 1

Results

• Obtained limited number of 24/380 surveys, but the information was still valuable.



In-person engagement of about 120 AFH owners

"Don't ask us questions, **tell us** what you want us to do"

Discussions with regulatory partners

"Provide guidance in plain and direct language"

Conclusion

- AFH owners want continuous engagement with their LHJ and DOH.
- In-person meetings were a more effective way to gather feedback compared to surveys and helped establish trustful relationships with AFH and public health.
- To improve epidemic preparedness, an AFH Epidemic Preparedness Tool was developed which incorporates elements of outbreak management in plain language.
 - The Tool was informed through community engagement by subject matter experts.
