

Parental Awareness of the Importance of a Child's First Dental Visit

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Background

The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry (AAPD) recommends that every child should attend their first dental visit within six months of the eruption of the first tooth or by the age of one. This visit not only allows for early detection of tooth decay, but it also is important for educating parents about oral health care prevention and anticipatory guidance. Introduction



Parents of new patients in the pediatric dental clinic were asked to fill out surveys to evaluate their awareness of a first visit in order to understand how we can better educate parents of our community.

Methods


A cross-sectional study was completed with IRB approval. 50 surveys were collected via an iPad from the parents of new patients who visited East Carolina School of Dental Medicine for a new patient exam. REDCap was used to store and report the collected data from the surveys
