Elective Empowerment: Students Prescribe Their Ideal Pharmacy Education Journey

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
INTRODUCTION:

- Per ACPE Draft Standards 2025, electives should "permit **exploration** of and/or **advance studies** of professional **interest.**"
- Critical to provide elective options that **enhance** student **knowledge and skills** in areas of interest.
- Flexible and prevalent elective offerings can combat curriculum bloat and improve student satisfaction.

- Using a qualtrics survey, student interest in elective topics based on academic year and student interest in earning a concentration or digital badge was collected.
- Responses were gathered over two weeks, with a reminder sent two days before survey closing

DISCUSSION:



- Students in the P1 and P2 years have more interest in research and industry electives
- Students in the **P3 and P4** years have more interest in **advanced clinical topics.**



• This pattern is not unexpected and may be attributed to **the increase in clinical exposure** students gain later in the curriculum.



- Pharmacy curricula should offer a variety of elective topics to support more comprehensive education for students.
- Increased elective variety will support professional identity formation in students



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
