



Background

- The ability to interpret and apply medical literature to clinical situations is essential to the completion of the Pharmacists' Patient Care Process put forth by the Joint Commission of Pharmacy Practitioners¹
- Journal clubs (JCs) are a useful tool in teaching literature evaluation and in helping meet Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education standards²
- Previous studies indicate that student-led JCs help increase student confidence in their literature evaluation skills^{3,4}
- There appears to be a lack of literature related to qualitative feedback on faculty-led JC style courses for PharmD students

Objective

To qualitatively assess self-reflections of student pharmacists engaged in a weekly, online, synchronous, literature evaluation course

Methods

Qualitative methods were used to assess self-reflections of third year student pharmacists engaged in a literature evaluation course.

- Weekly, online, synchronous, journal club (JC) discussions facilitated by two faculty members (clinical pharmacy and epidemiology backgrounds).
- Each week involved a different article and guest faculty joining with expertise in the topic.
- Pre-work comprised critical evaluation worksheets (first two weeks) and summary critique questions (remaining weeks).

Please reflect on your journey in learning to critically review medical literature touching on the following:

- 1) key experiences/activities beneficial to you in learning these skills, 2) your <u>confidence</u> in these skills (over time and currently) and 3) your impressions on how valuable these skills will be in your future training and/or career.
- 4) Discuss 2 approaches that you feel are important and would implement/utilize when you lead a journal club discussion on your own in the future



Figure 2. Grounded Theory Steps⁵



Students noted both

Summary

variation (different articles each week) and also repetition (weekly journal clubs) as beneficial course experiences.

Scaffolding (progressively less guidance) as well as conversation with the class were also noted as helpful

The majority of students noted an increase in confidence through practice, repetition and gaining familiarity with the process

Engagement, active discussion and the need for relevant topics were were all noted as necessary

Applicability to clinical setting/practice

When asked how literature evaluation could be valuable to their careers, students noted improved patient care through literature applicable to their practice or clinical setting

- Students described weekly repetition of JCs, varied article types, and scaffolded assignments as beneficial to learning
- Literature evaluation skills noted to be valuable in future career as practicing pharmacist, particularly for making decisions and in speaking with patients/healthcare providers.

Conclusions

• Students in a weekly, online, synchronous literature evaluation course reported increased confidence in skills over time, noting that practice was key
